THE BEDROCK OF BRUU

When we think of BRUU we think of the spirit and community of our congregation. We think of how much we get from BRUU and how much BRUU gives. But the congregation would be hard pressed to continue as we now are without a place to gather in. Our building is the foundation of all that we are. It is our bedrock and without it we can't go forth well.

Thirteen years ago it was decided to buy this building, recognizing that as an older building it would need more upkeep than a new building and this would be an ongoing issue. The price for the building was right and we took on this added responsibility. During the first years BRUU was in the building, there was a strong sense of camaraderie and "let's roll up our sleeves and get this place spiffed up." People would sign up weekly to clean the building until we finally splurged on janitorial help. Other churches have a sexton—paid staff to do the repairs a building always needs doing. We have decided to do the work ourselves—by volunteers. This is all well and good—if we actually are committed to doing the work ourselves and volunteer when asked. About five times a year we have a workday. I challenge everyone to commit to coming to at least one workday a year. That would be over 50 people each workday and that's 50 different people! Instead we usually get between 10 and 15 people and mostly the same faces. I acknowledge that workday usually involves a lot of painting—but that is what a highly used building like this constantly needs. We also always have cleaning projects, but often don't get to them because we don't have enough people.

So again, thirteen years ago we committed to buying an older building, recognizing that it would need more upkeep than a new building. Think about how much you spend on your own homes throughout the year, fixing leaky faucets and broken light fixtures, replacing worn carpeting, buying furniture, or even replacing large ticket items like boilers etc. Now think about trying to do this for our large eighty-year-old building for \$3,000 annually! This is a shoestring budget that requires extreme amounts of sweat equity if we want to see any improvement. It would be lovely to increase the amount we spend on the building and it is very much needed, but then we would have to give up something else we spend money on at BRUU. Ah, the conundrum of balancing the budget. So at the auction this month, come early and spend freely! That's the ticket if we want BRUU to remain healthy. And remember to come to our next work day in January.
