

Children in Worship? But our services hold content that is completely inappropriate for children. Maybe over 14, you say. They are probably mature enough to absorb the content.

To be completely honest, I don't know what content is in our services. My position requires me to leave service with the children and youth. So I can't speak to the content of our sermons.

I can speak to the issues that \underline{our} children and youth are dealing with in their lives. It might come up in RE, it may come up in a social conversation, it definitely comes up in my own interactions as a parent; but this is what I know for a FACT children ages 5-18 are dealing with, thinking about, struggle with and would really appreciate hearing some illuminated speaking about. After reading the list, please let me know if they are on your list of things kids don't need to have their bubble bursted with.

Immigration: Many of our families are blessed to live in multicultural areas, and our children in multicultural schools. My third grader's lunch table has had an ongoing conversation about how to protect "friend's" grandmother from being detected and taken away. I agree, this is a topic no 8 year old should *have* to deal with, but they do. The underlying sentiment is caring for those in their community, and they take it very seriously.

Violence: As confusing as this is for adults, you better believe our children and youth are witnessing it too. Are police good guys or bad guys? 22 Dead at a pop concert. Can we get gas on Route 234? Along with the fire drills, our elementary school practices active shooter drills. In each one of the classrooms, a student is assigned to break the window, in case they cannot exit through the hallways.

Sexual orientation/Gender identity? Children as young as preschool are defining their own gender. My sixth grader reports same –sex relationships at her middle school. Acceptance may be improving for adults, but children are constantly being told how they "should" be. Being different puts a target on your head for bullies.

Peer Relationships: Growing up is an incredibly difficult thing to do. Our children and youth are still trying to figure out the rules. That results in what that applied last week does not necessarily function this week. Our young people are also deeply concerned about their friend's emotional and physical health. Secrets among friends often have to do with another threatening suicide, violence, or other self- destructive behavior. Even if the "problem" is not their own, the "burden" of caring for a friend without any apparent resources is a big heavy deal to a young person.

There are more, I promise.

In a recent blog on the Huffington Post, Rabbi Menachem Creditor, responding to complaints about children being in the synagogue wrote "Our sanctuaries are not sanctuaries from children."

Children need adults in their lives who are not their parents. They need other places to be to learn, to feel free to be themselves, to feel safe.

In an ideal situation, no parent has all the answers or the magic pill that makes it all better. In less desirable situations, the home life could be the struggle.

You model what we, as adults gathering in a place with a commonly agreed upon standard for being human. You – the big people – can show our young people how to treat other people. You can share a space to talk about it.

You, of course deserve a quiet place for contemplation. And our children do too.

From the guard at the security desk who buzzed me through the door to the man juggling multiple packages holding the elevator for me. You get the picture. As a result, there has been more smiling (from me and the recipient), more conversation and slightly less fatigue throughout the day. I realize correlation is not causation but it does seem to be having a positive effect on me and others.

William James said that the "deepest principle of human nature is the need to be appreciated." My challenge to you is to make your appreciation known to those around you. Let me know how it goes. I believe that kindness begets kindness and I'm finding that expressing gratitude seems to have additive effect too.
