From the President's Desk

On September 8th, we hit a major milestone in our history: Our 25th year at the corner of Church and Main. Looking back on both the amazing people who formed Bull Run Unitarian Universalists as a congregation, and the leaders who made an incredible leap of faith in 1999 by purchasing this building as our home. I had to reflect on the attributes of past and current members in meeting the many challenges that have occurred since our inception as a faith community and nonprofit organization. This is especially noteworthy as we consider stewardship of this beloved community and the generosity that is critical to our endurance and success as a safe community for seeking and service.

Each year, members renew their pledge to BRUU through a commitment of time, talent and treasure. To many, this promise of “time and talent” could simply be described as “volunteering.” However, at BRUU it’s more than that. From our members, it comes from deep within, a CALL TO ACTION, the need to make change in the world around us. The “treasure” is insufficient. For our member it might be better described as a fundamental philanthropic partnership with BRUU that makes our hopes and dreams for a better world more than just a possibility. Our initial individual reasons for joining in membership and for remaining in covenant and engagement are now settled in a commitment to deepen our spiritual lives, to ensure a place to support all our children’s religious education with open minds and hearts, to create welcoming ways to socialize beyond our usual orbits, and possibly to realize our commitment to make the world around us a better place for all.

Board Matters

The August 2024 Board Meeting was held on August 15 at 7:00 p.m. in the BRUU Conference Room and is available on Zoom, except for a Closed Executive Session.

At this meeting, the Board approved the Consent Agenda and reports from the President, Program Council, Staff, and Membership, Minutes of board meetings on August 15 and 25 (the latter to discuss vacancy in Vice President position).

Please see BRUUnet KnowledgeBase for Board Meeting minutes, as well as attachments in support of these reports (Proclamation, Schedules for Board and Congregation) and those provided to the Board in advance (the BRUU Strategic Plan, the CUUPS proposal and the Reinstatement of Membership draft) to support their work at this meeting.

- Status of member engagement: Leadership Development Funds have been approved by the funder for support of social and stewardship engagement
- Stewardship: Planning for a 7-month Stewardship process begins in October preparing for the Canvass Kick-off in February, with a Canvass celebration planned for May (perhaps following the May Town Hall). Contact Martha Muirhead if you're interested in sharing your ideas or time on this vital endeavor.
- Congregational Survey: Dianne Lane and Charlie Grymes have stepped up to develop various ways to survey the congregation as mentioned in the August Town Hall. Additionally, the completed survey may help with stewardship planning by providing the Board with info on congregational expectations about BRUU services and activities, as well as thoughts on a future ministerial search.
- BRUU Strategic Plan and Priorities, financial strategy, and Perpetual Calendar: Art reports that some committee reports are in and he will have the Program Council revisit the Strategic Plan and priorities. In discussion about board member responsibilities, the Board agrees that at-large member Michelle Feagas-Foster will liaison with Fellowship and (once elected) the incoming Vice

President may also help the President with the Perpetual Calendar update.

- Rotational Ministers at BRUU: Kristin reports that Worship Committee will begin using one per month beginning October 2024. Unused funds may be reallocated by the Board as needed.
- CUUPS Chapter AT BRUU: The Board has approved the inclusion of a chapter of Covenant of Unitarian Universalist Pagans in BRUU offerings to anyone interested. CUUPS is an organization dedicated to networking Pagan-identified Unitarian Universalists, educating people about Paganism, promoting interfaith dialogue, developing Pagan liturgies and theologies, and supporting Pagan-identified UU religious professionals. Annaliess Trommatter will be the lead on this and will provide more information through our various communication resources.
- Camera/Internet project: John, Theo and Mike are still discussing this project, but the Camera portion is not moving forward until wiring for internet is completed as it's critical that the wiring be professionally done.
- Accessibility and safety; Pastoral Care is taking action to provide suitable seating for folks who need it during Coffee Hour. Membership will be asked if Greeters can learn how to operate the lift and assist folks with walkers, etc. up the steps. This will entail posting instructions for helpers, including who should be contacted if/when the lift is stuck.
- Elevator Issue: Since the cost of an elevator is not currently feasible, John suggests a chair lift. Considering this a temporary measure, an idea of costs is needed. John will ask Christine to get three estimates for the next Board meeting.
- UUA Relationship with BRUU: As mentioned at the May Town Hall, Angie will be arranging a zoom meeting with UUA contacts (CER Sana Saeed, Megan Foley) in October to discuss UUAs relationship with BRUU and respond to questions from the BRUU Board. Sandra Fox and Terry McClure have agreed to

attend as well. Former President ex-officio Rita Romano will be invited to attend.

- **Annual Report:** Angie is interested in utilizing the information to create a vibrant report for next year's Congregational Meeting. More discussion ahead.
- **Ministerial Services Gap:** This gap in ministerial services prompted us to ask who is best suited to counsel individuals experiencing grief/distress and to celebrate special life events, like weddings and memorials. Suggestions include paying ministers from nearby congregations and contracting with a professional for counselling services. Angie will talk to Pastoral Care about their needs and for suggestions.
- **Update on Vice President Position:** We expect to fill this position in the next few weeks, which can be approved by the Board per our Bylaws and will update the congregation in the Crossroads newsletter.

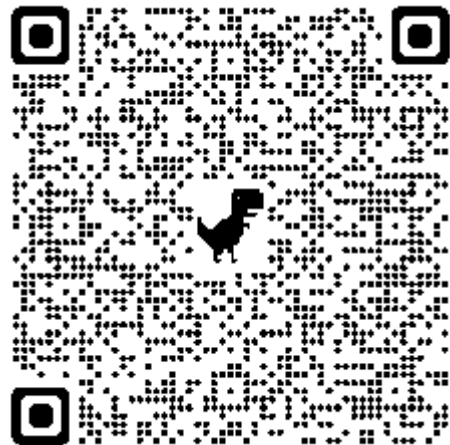

News from the Food Pantry

It's been awhile since you have heard from BRUU's food pantry and I apologize for that.

It is a mission here at BRUU that is dear to my heart and continues to evolve since I came on as food pantry manager during the height of the pandemic.

The food pantry exists and continues to serve clients thanks to many kind people both who are BRUU'ers and who do not attend our church. These wonderful people help with set up, deliveries, picking up food, distribution, ordering, going out to farms to pick produce, registering our clients, keeping records and of course financial contributions.

With Terrie McClure's help and vision the 2 different food pantries BRUU used to operate have now merged into one.

Effectively, we have moved food and re designed our system once again since the height of the pandemic and have claimed new storage areas in the church to facilitate the process of serving our families and not over working our volunteers.

Until recently we were operating out of 4 different areas in the church and going up and down alot of stairs. I am happy to report that all of our activities and storage are now on one floor.

From serving up to 120 families twice a month during COVID, our numbers fluctuated and stabilized to approximately 50-60 families in the past few months however at our last distribution we served 87 families.

With winter coming and the price of food high, I don't expect our numbers to decrease.

Many of our congregants used to give regularly and generously to support the food pantry budget and during COVID we received contributions from other churches, our own Bull Run Investment Club and community organizations. Our budget was healthy and our community assistance program was in need of funds to help clients with basics such as paying rent and utilities.

BRUU'ers who gave regularly to the food pantry were asked to switch their contributions to BRUU's community assistance budget and split the plate was designated for community assistance. Three years later our food pantry budget needs replenishing and I hope you will consider giving to this worthy cause. Any and every financial contribution from you to the food pantry is most greatly appreciated! We also gladly receive food donations from you and are happy to let you know what we are in need of. Please, reach out if you would like to volunteer as well.

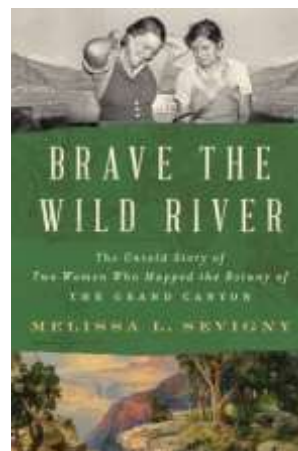
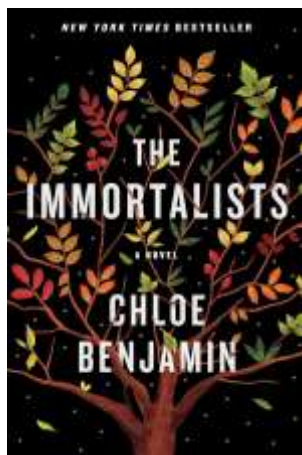
